Networks are funded from a mix of sources including participation fees, support from state payors like Medicaid, and grants to support innovation and research.

4. How are the contributions to the network from the community validated and/or moderated?

Governance is a central issue for networks based on contribution and generosity. This is known as non-market production or peer production. There is extensive work that has been done on this topic with the most notable being the work of Elinor Ostrom and her Nobel Prize on "Governing the Commons."
